

The new pelican crossing has been installed by the county council and is fully operational. It is part of the active travel corridor which will connect the Lyppard Hub, Aconbury and down to the city.

Plans for new Secondary School



Plans for a new 600-place secondary school are currently in the process of being finalised before being submitted later this summer. The location of the new school will be on Newtown Road, between the hospital and the A4440 roundabout. Oasis Community Learning- a multi academy trust that runs schools across five regions of the UK- will operate the school and there is a target of Summer 2026 for the opening of the school, with the school reaching capacity by 2031. The new school would offer children and young people living

within Warndon Parish a reduced journey to school but there are implications for parking, congestion and traffic. The online consultation has now closed, but should anyone have any questions or feedback it can be emailed to NewSecondarySchool@worcschildrenfirst.org.uk

The Brecon Avenue MUGA (Multi-Use Games Area) was completed by the City Council contractors in the middle of April. It is well used and really appreciated. It will be officially opened at the beginning of August.

Police officer numbers hit historic high in West Mercia

A record number of police officers, 2494 in total, are now serving in West Mercia, as officer numbers hit new highs. Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion has supported West Mercia Police's Chief Constable to not only meet the Government's uplift target for West Mercia, but exceed it. Your police force now has a headcount of 2494 officers, with officer numbers increasing by 508 since the PCC was first elected in 2016. A further boost to officer numbers will happen in this financial year, with an additional 40 officers recruited to create new community crime fighting teams. The PCC is committed to ensuring police officers are accessible and visible in your community, tackling the issues that matter to you.

Worcester Environmental Group (WEG)

In May, Worcester Environmental Group (WEG) working in collaboration with Worcester City Council officially launched the 'Wild about Worcester Way' a way-marked 12-mile route, which enables residents to explore greenspaces in our beautiful city, learn about nature and improve their own health and wellbeing. This route is also a 'wildlife corridor', promoting an increase in biodiversity and protection of the environment. With people's increased desire to get out into green-spaces, having a marked route can give people the confidence to do it!

Feedback from users has been very positive, with people, having lived in Worcester for more than 30 years discovering greenspaces they did not know existed. You can either complete the full circular 12-mile route, or split it into a number of shorter walks. Worcester Environmental Groups run a number of volunteer events throughout the city and following the recent recruitment of a volunteer co-ordinator, there will now be weekly events taking place. Environmental Matters

This year, due to the combination of a wet spring followed by a prolonged warm spell, has created ideal growing conditions and we have seen some exceptional growth in our hedgerows and greenspaces. With so many of the footpaths/cycleways affected it has been necessary for the City Council Streetscene Team to carry out some light pruning work, earlier in the season than in previous years. The team are observant of bird nesting guidelines and ensure no birds are present before commencing this work. You may also have noticed that areas of our greenspaces are being left unmown, this is intentional to try to encourage more flower species to develop, which in turn will attract more insects and wildlife and increase biodiversity, evidenced by the presence of wild orchids in the parish in more recent years!

It is also so important to be aware of other native plants growing in the parish and the UK. At first glance hemlock, cow parsley, ground elder and wild carrot may appear to be the same plant, as they all have white flowers and bloom around the same time, but while cow parsley is edible, hemlock is poisonous.



<u>Cow Parsley</u> flowering in May, the flowers are small and delicate and are arranged in groups of up to 10 to form an umbel. The leaves are green and feathery and the stalk is striated. It is edible but it can be difficult to identify from some very poisonous relations.

<u>Hemlock</u> all parts of this plant, when ingested, can be fatal to humans and animals. In appearance, hemlock could very easily be mistaken for wild carrot or cow parsley and is often found in similar areas, it flowers in June/July and its leaves have a glossy sheen and its stem has distinctive purple blotches and can grow up to 2 metres. One of its defining characteristics is its foul odour, reminiscent of rodent urine.



Giant Hogweed often grows in excess of 2 metres and sometimes as tall as 5 metres, with thick stems. The large leaves are deep green in colour with clear lobes and jagged edges but with reddish-purple blotches and pronounced white hairs. The umbels are enormous, measuring up to 60cm across. Contact with giant hogweed should be avoided, particularly under strong sunlight, as, even after minimal contact, its sap can result in large, painful blisters on the skin.

Also be aware some really common plants can cause canine poisoning, especially spring bulbs, daffodils, tulips, bluebells and crocus along with foxgloves, rhododendron, and deadly nightshade are all poisonous.

<u>Ticks</u> We also need to take care when going for walks and check ourselves and our pets for ticks on our return. Numerous species of tick are found in the UK, they look like small, large-bodied spiders. generally reddish brown/black in colour and some can be carrying harmful bacteria, like Lyme disease that can spread to humans. Tick season is usually between March and October but it may last longer. If you've been bitten by a tick, you should try to remove it as soon as possible. Symptoms of a tick bite can take up to 2 to 3 months to develop When walking in long grass or woodland cover up with long sleeved tops and tuck trousers into your socks limiting the opportunities for ticks to attach to you.
